





CPT. ROBERT VAN Why is it, then, that such a strategically important Union asset has been given the least amount of protection from confederate ambushes? The most recent example of this bumbling leadership is the recent re-appointment of Captain Robert Van and the 49th Indiana as primary protection of the H&DC line. Military and company records show Capt. Van and the 49th IN were attacked, and failed to defend railroad assets 25 times over a two-day period about this time last year. Twenty-five locomotives, 50 passenger cars, hundreds of civilians and over \$6 million of gold bullion was captured by treasonous confederate forces in that two-day period. In each ambush, Captain Van's lack of tactical prowess, by having his troops disembark the train and confront entrenched and fortified rebel positions Captain Van's "defense" of the H&DC repeatedly, defies logic. railroad can only be described as a stupendous failure. Even his near acquaintances describe him as "timid, vacillating and inefficient." Indeed, under his leadership, the 49th Indiana as a unit has been described as "weak as water" and "-as a whole, -are not equal to the occasion" by General Winfield Scott. And while a court of inquiry reinstated Captain Van of his rank and command, Charles Sumner, Republican senator from Massachusetts who chaired committee and wrote the dissenting opinion, stated "there is a strong feeling among those who have seen Captain Van, in the way of business, that he lacks the practical talent for his



readiness, and also more capacity, for command. It is the recommendation of this court that perhaps someone like 1st Sgt. Ian Fulford should be promoted in his place."

More Gold Shipments Lost to Enemy, Again.

In recent months, many gold shipments have been lost to enemy hands just miles from Hesston Junction. At least 4 shipments have been lost in that many weeks. It is believed that there is a Confederate spy, or many, taking information on when shipments are being sent out on the railroad. Ted Rita, superintendent for the railroad, has reported that all is being done to find this spy and protect the shipment, personally, and by Federal Officer Captain Rob Van of the 49th Indiana Volunteer Infantry. 12.

It is believed that the past week. shipments by have been Confederate guerrilla unit operating in the area. Shipment times and routes have not been public knowledge, but somehow the Guerrilla unit always knows which train to attack. When stopped, as passengers have informed this paper, the Guerrilla unit calling themselves "The Missouri Guerrillas", Martin Charles have

implementing these attacks upon the payroll trains. It has also been reported an artillery has been used to stop the train. It is believed that it is the 1st Mississippi Light Artillery, led by one Captain Daniel Devea and a Calvary unit from Tennessee lead by Lt. Kevin Wright. Now, not to be out done it seems there is a more ruthless officer in the ranks of the Guerrillas, Michael Davis. His rank unknown, this reporter has it on good sources that this man was responsible for destruction of a critical bridge which held up trains for many weeks. A price is now on his head of \$100 dollars to be paid by the Union Army.

These attacks have resulted in the entire train of passengers also being kidnapped and forced make a trip to Richmond, Virginia. Upon arriving in Virginia, passengers are released to find their way home. A few passengers have been harmed when they refused to cooperate. None have been fatally wounded at this time. It has also been reported that there has been a mysterious woman on board at least three of the trains posing as a laundress and had possibly signaling what train to attack by placing a white linen laundry bag at the end of the passenger car. She is believed to be Danielle Case, a local woman. It is known that her husband is enlisted in the Confederate army, in the fore-mentioned artillery unit. 

Mr. Rita of the railroad company says he trusts Mr. Van to keep his locomotives and rolling stock safe. Adding that "the rebs are cunning, but Capt. Van is up for this challenge". He was also heard to say, "…for as many trains as he loses, he captures one back!"




Devastation Hesston, Indiana

INDY ELEVEN CARMELFEST PARADE RULES

Organization name: 49th Indiana Co. F Civil War Re-enactment Company

You are unit #: 39

As the parade approaches the *MEDIAN* at 126th Street and Rangeline Road, the parade units will be directed by a Parade Marshal to divide. *EVEN* number units will travel on the *RIGHT* and *ODD* number units will travel on the *LEFT* side of the median. At the new roundabout at 126th and Rangeline Road, you will continue on the left and right. At the end of the median and roundabout, units will once again form a single line and travel down the centerline of the street.

All units must maintain 2.0 mph (marching speed). Keep a good pace. Signs will be posted prior to the review stand so that you can be prepared to perform; however your performance must continually move forward. NO STOPPING TO PERFORM! The Review Stand will be located in front of the former Shapiro's Deli at 918 S. Range Line Road, on the west side of the street. The parade will be videotaped and will be shown on local Carmel channels.

- 1. We will, at all times, attempt to maintain a maximum 30 foot interval between units . . . no gaps in the parade.
- 2. Please see the attached rules regarding candy distribution.
- 3. Do not stop to perform! NO EXCEPTION!
- 4. There will be no squirt guns or water guns.
- 5. All units must be as described in your parade application or you will not be able to participate. This is a Grated family event!
- 6. Your unit must be pre-registered for the event and approved by the CarmelFest Parade Committee. All units except bands and large units (we will let you know if you are a large unit) will enter the staging area from the south end of Merchants Square off 116th Street and be directed to your staging area by the parade marshals. Do not enter from Carmel Drive. This causes much confusion and backing up of large vehicles Bands will stage at the Carmel Marketplace (Fountains) at 502 E. Carmel Drive. Large units will enter and stage directly on Carmel Drive.

Unit numbers are assigned and your staging area is located on the enclosed map. Check in will be done by the parade marshal in your section. The parade marshal will give you your unit number placard which must be displayed on the front left of the vehicle or unit. This number will be used by the TV commentators to identify your unit. The parade marshal will also review these rules with you. All participants must complete and sign a Waiver Release Form prior to participation in the parade. These forms will be picked up by the parade marshal the morning of the parade. The Waiver Release Form can be found on the Parade Registration page of our website, www.carmelfest.net, under events select Parade, the link is on the right. I recommend bringing some for last minute people that join your unit.

Shuttle vans will be available at the southwest corner of Carmel High School between door 7 and 8, to return <u>individuals</u> to Merchants Square during the entire parade (running approximately every 15 minutes.) Carmel Police will be available to escort large units back to MCL, <u>only at the end of the parade (approximately 12:30 p.m)</u>

The parade will start promptly at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, July 4th, rain or shine. If your unit is to be judged, be in place by 8:30 a.m., otherwise, no later than 10:00 in line, ready to go, or you will be scratched. We are attempting to limit the parade to 90 minutes. Please operate your vehicles in a safe manner. Let's have a fun day and enjoy the parade!

CANDY DISTRIBUTION

It does not look like there will be a painted line down the street. So PRETEND there is a line one foot from the curb. We are working through with the street department providing barricades at the 2 roundabouts and at the Rangeline Main street corner. You may pass candy over any barricades we get.

I am thankful we started the rule that those distribution candy must be 15 or older, especially in light of the 7 year-old child that was run over in New Castle last month.

Candy may be distributed this year.

There will be an imaginary candy line down both sides of the street. Children must be behind this line to get candy. If they are not behind the line, DO NOT GIVE THEM CANDY!

Candy must be handed, not thrown. This means you will need walkers down both sides to distribute candy.

People distributing candy must be 15 or older. This is very important. Children will still try to cross the candy line to get to the walkers. Walkers under the age of 15 get overwhelmed by these children.

We recommend a sturdy container for your candy. Plastic bags tend to tear and drop candy in the middle of the road.

If your walker drops candy in the street, please pick it up! This is a huge safety issue.


The police and fire department will be enforcing these rules. Violations will result in being banned from future parades.

Please do not feel obligated to distribute candy if you cannot comply with these rules.

IMPORTANT CHANGE FOR LARGE WALKING ENTRIES.

There will be a limit of 25 walking participants per unit.

<u>Clubs for dance, cheer, athletics, etc must limit their participants! If you are distributing candy we will allow another 10 walkers that are 15 or older</u>


